Once again we would like our readers to submit articles for future publications. We are also looking to hear from any businesses wishing to advertise in Drakes Drinker.



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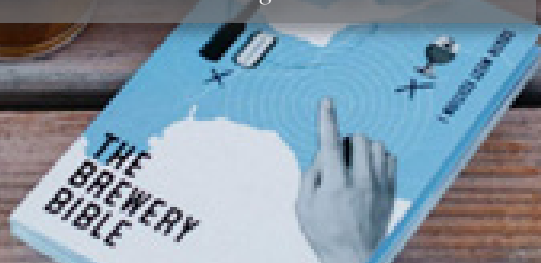
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SUE'S PROPER JOB

The Brewery Bible (South West)

In Plymouth we are hoppily poised on the border between two great brewing counties, Devon and Cornwall – so I'm pleased that a pint sized new guide to breweries visits the South West for its inaugural edition.

The Brewery Bible is edited by a friend and sometimes fellow judge at beer and cider tastings, Adrian Tierney-Jones, who has won many awards for beer writing and can instantly tell you what ails ale when it fails to please.

And I'm especially pleased that the very first Devon entry is for a Plymouth brewery I've never heard of – Anchor House Brewery with Smeaton's Tower on their logo. So new it's not in the 2020 Good Beer Guide; and so pleased

was I, I immediately phoned them and spoke to founder Tomas Jackson.

I asked him where they are, and then discovered they are a peripatetic brewery, using other brewers' kit to produce small batch brews. The last was a traditional style pale ale called Anchor House but the aim is experimental beers; for Mayflower 400 next year they plan New England style six per cent cloudy pale ale using US and UK hops called Sub Zero because they'll add the hops after the boil.

Our local Vessel beer shop – supporter of new breweries – gets a page. Perhaps surprisingly, Summerskills of Plymouth does not get a write-up; but they and Roam Brewery, whose



brewery tap in Peverell only opened in August (on Friday nights and all day Saturday only), are both included in the list of Devon pubs.

On a recent trip to a pub well liked by Plymouth CAMRA, the Blisland Inn near Bodmin Moor, my husband went AWOL with the landlord to visit nearby Dowr Kammel (Crooked River in Cornish) Brewery. It's not in the 'Bible' so I'd like to mention them here as they grow two fields of Perle hops flavouring amber ale Demelza plus nine other beers including Blisland Gold served in the pub, and powerful Big Cat IPA at 7.7 per cent, all brewed with their own Cornish spring water – and they “try to brew on sunny days to harness the Sun's power whilst brewing” and

store beers underground in a man made beer cave in summer.

But the book's not all about smaller breweries. Two of the nation's biggest, St Austell and Sharp's in Cornwall, are both featured. Likewise longstanding Dartmoor Brewery in Princetown, producer of iconic Jail Ale, which celebrates its Silver Jubilee this year.

Stretching right across the West Country as far as Gloucestershire with features such as beer and cheese pairing, and the marvel of malts, it's a chatty and useful guide published by Altum Media, price £6.99; visit thebrewerybible.com

New Voting Criteria for POTY 2020

Following discussions since the 2019 branch AGM, the branch, at an open branch meeting held in September 2019, voted unanimously to amend the POTY voting criteria.

FIRST ROUND – Shortlist Voting

- 1) Each member of the branch, as listed on the National Membership Database on 1 December, can submit POTY votes either via email or by post, between 1st and 31st December. Members can vote for their Best City Pub, Best Country Pub, Best Cider Pub and Best Club, by downloading the voting form from the branch website.
- 2) The NBSS Coordinator will download and analyse data for the period 1st January to 31st December, on a date in early January. This will determine the highest averaging pub and club in each category, except cider. The NBSS Coordinator will also use the Confidence Rating part of the software. This will determine the best city pub, country pub and club, by beer score. Please do not attempt to score cider by using the National Beer Scoring System!
- 3) The highest voted pub in each category in 1) above, and highest averaging pub in each category in 2) above will be nominated. If they are same establishment, then the second-placed establishment from NBSS will be selected.
- 4) These results will be announced at the January Branch Social Meeting.

SECOND ROUND – Selection Surveys

- 4) The top two establishments from the FIRST ROUND in each category above – City Pub, Country Pub, Cider Pub and Club – will be surveyed by Branch Members using the standard CAMRA POTY Judging Form. Marks out of 10 are awarded for:- Quality of Beer/Cider/Perry (X weighting factor (2)) ; Style/Décor/Furnishing and Cleanliness; Service, Welcome & Offering; Community Focus and Atmosphere (X weighting factor (2)); Alignment with CAMRA principles; & Overall Impression; to give the venue a score out of 80.
- 5) Members do not have to survey each category of pub; however, they MUST visit each pub in a category that they do wish to judge for their vote to count.

6) Surveys MUST take place between the January Branch Meeting and the February Meeting/Social – roughly four weeks should be sufficient time. Judging forms may be submitted electronically or by post; paper forms MUST arrive prior to the February Social Meeting.

THIRD ROUND – Winner Selection

7) The establishment receiving the highest average score in each category will be the winner of that category. The establishment achieving the highest average score will be the Branch Overall Pub Of The Year.

8) The Branch Committee will ensure that all final POTY Nominations meet current CAMRA criteria, excluding those that do not, and nominating the next highest as a replacement.

9) In the event of a tie, the Branch Chair will have a casting vote.

PUB & BREWERY NEWS

**The following pub and brewery news was reported at
the November Branch Social Meeting on Wednesday 6th
November**

Pub News

Trout 'N' Tipple, Tavistock, is now under new tenants again, as is the Royal Oak, Hooe, where Aaron (Pub On The Hoe) is in temporary charge for an unknown period. Nowhere Inn, City Centre, has re-opened and continues to offer a CAMRA Members Discount of 20p off pint/real ale – Thank you very much Simon Barrett (new licensee). Paperwork to support the application to grant the Mount Pleasant, Millbay, as an Asset of Community Value (ACV) has been received and acknowledged by the city council for consideration until 28 December. A week of festive merriment at the London Inn, Plympton St Maurice, begins with a Festive Real Ale beer festival during the usual pub opening hours. Duke of York Hotel, Tavistock, is under new management again, and serves Doom Bar. Dolphin Inn, Kingston, is also under new management, as is the Blacksmith's Arms, Lamerton - believed to be the current tenants, (TBC). Great Western Railway Staff Association Club, Laira, Laira, serves at least one cask ale in very good condition, but has up to three at weekends. Summerskills Indiana's Bones was seen there recently. It is now open to new members. Hyde Park Social Club, Mutley, has no real ale, but will admit non-members for a nominal charge of £2.00. Indian Inn, Stoke, now serves at least one cask conditioned real ale on weekends, recently Summerskills Plymouth Porter. Walkhampton Inn, Walkhampton, now serves four real ciders and one real perry. King Billy (King Billy), formally known as the Bristol Castle, has been refurbished and re-opened recently. However, real ale is not available here. Sadly, it has been reported that Helen Gaye, long-standing of the Warren House Inn, Postbridge, passed away suddenly recently - we send our condolences to her family and friends at this sad time.

Cask Marque Accreditation

Dolphin Inn, Kingston, has lost its' Cask Marque accreditation, due to the change in management. No other local branch area pubs/clubs gained/lost Cask Marque accreditation recently.

Brewery News

All local breweries are now well prepared for the Christmas period with Christmas Specials waiting to hit the streets – we wish them all a Very Merry Christmas time! We were informed of yet another new brewery in our patch, Ivybridge Brewing Company, a community brewery providing opportunities for people with learning disabilities – Good Luck to them. Volunteers are still required for the position of BLO for Anchor House, Billy Ruffian's and Steel Brew Co, as well as Ivybridge. 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THE JOYS OF BEING A PLO

(That's Pub Liaison Officer to you...)

*A*t a recent CAMRA branch meeting I attended, some attendees expressed surprise at some of the duties of a PLO, and how they might undertake them.

As I responded to one or two questions, it was suggested that, in the interest of potential PLO's, CAMRA members and indeed publicans, I might like to put my thoughts on paper on what might be involved....

First off, I went to two publicans, both of whose hostelries are in the 2020 Good Beer Guide, for their thoughts.

"I think a PLO should help their pub towards getting in, and staying in, the GBG, as that is the mark of a good pub which keeps good beer. Also a PLO should promote CAMRA to the pub and its' patrons – WITHOUT PRESSURISING THEM," says Giles Hawkins from the Albert Inn.

OK – so sometimes CAMRA members – and indeed CAMRA itself - have not got the best reputation. (The expression "beer bores"

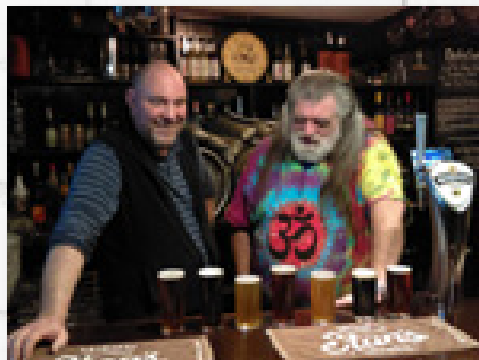
springs to mind....) Hence a bit of tact and diplomacy is needed – imagine someone much less qualified than you at your job telling YOU how to do it better....

A second clue in how to be a good PLO is in the title itself....Liaison....

"In my humble opinion the role of a Pub Liaison Officer is self-explanatory. It is to liaise with or to advise and maybe suggest different things to pub landlords that they may have seen work elsewhere or to warn against things that they may have seen fail," says Palk Arms landlord Mike Rowland

"I don't think it is in the remit of a PLO to instruct or to take any control away from the Landlord/Landlady. Pubs rise or god forbid fall for millions of reasons, but the best pubs tend to be ones of unique character and style not ones that have a formula for success thrust upon them", he argues.

So.....liaison....the PLO should be in regular contact with the landlord – this



can be in person for a pint, or by phone for a quick chat. Build a relationship with your landlord. Sadly I know of PLO's who visit their charge once a quarter – announce their presence like some high-powered Civil Servant, and expect free beer in return for giving a lecture on CAMRA and the perfect pint.

Communication....A quiet conversation between you and your charge often produces points of discussion. Trust has to be earned, especially by the PLO – remember you may be trying to help, but it is the landlord's business at the end of the day, so if something is said in confidence to you, it should remain that way.

By the way - don't forget to Beer Score – and perhaps more importantly - explain the beer scoring process to the publican. This helps the landlord understand CAMRA's aims – and if a regular or two happens to see/hear this, so much the better.

Remember we are ALL there to promote

CAMRA, not brow-beat people.

A publican will appreciate encouragement, and will certainly appreciate you helping to promote the pub. With this last point in mind, PLO's have the perfect opportunity to do this.

Your branch magazine has pages reserved for pub info – one of your tasks should be to obtain and supply information to the editor. It need not be too detailed – the dates of a beer festival – a revamp of the pub, community involvement for example. Who knows, when you ask mine host to stock the magazine, it may lead to an advert – helping both branch and publican.

So there you have it. I don't suggest my "way" is perfect (to be fair I am not the most rule-minded CAMRA member in the world!), but it works for me....and the landlords I liaise with....

ALES FROM THE DARK SIDE

*- Darker beer styles
for Autumn and Winter -*

Once British Summer Time comes to an end, the days shorten and the temperature dips, it's natural to seek out textures and flavours that soothe and warm our cold bones. Darker beers may express deeper, more heavily toasted characteristics, reminiscent of other comforting roasted foods and drinks such as coffee, spices, dark caramel and chocolate.

STOUTS

Look for a jet-black colour and expect a dark and roasted grain character with burnt fruit, espresso or cappuccino coffee, liquorice and molasses. The beer should have a deep bitterness to balance the richness of malt and fruit.

PORTERS

Porters tend to be dark brown in colour, and are sweeter than stouts, often with fruity, and chocolate notes.

IMPERIAL STOUTS AND PORTERS

Imperial stouts and porters turn their respective characteristics up to 11. To the drinker deciding what to choose at the bar the prefix Imperial often indicates a higher ABV and a more intense flavour experience. Imperial Stouts and Porters might also have completed the final leg of their fermentation in wooden barrels which may have previously contained spirits adding to the complexity and depth of flavour of the beer. The mouthfeel can be more viscous



and syrupy and, when combined with a higher level of alcohol, Imperial Stouts and Porters can be enjoyed slowly and savoured in thirds or halves. Preferably next to a roaring fire.

MILK STOUTS

Milk Stouts incorporate milk sugar (lactose) to give a silky and creamy texture and mouthfeel. The addition of lactose produces a sweeter beer and, in combination with darker malts, is likely to present flavours and aromas you might associate with other wintry treats like puddings and desserts e.g. chocolate, vanilla, honeycomb and caramelised or burnt sugar. Modern

experimentation in brewing that combines the high alcohol content of Imperial Stouts and Porters with lactose, spices and other flavouring additives (like chocolate or marshmallows) produces something in between styles and might be referred to as a pudding or a pastry stout.

MILDS

Usually dark brown in colour, due to the well-roasted malts although pale milds can be found. Look for a rich malty aroma and flavour, with hints of dark fruit, chocolate, coffee and caramel, with a gentle underpinning of hop bitterness.



- Meet the - **PUBLICAN**

Introducing Mark Cameron with his wife Sue who have been at the Avon Inn, Avonwick, TQ10 9NB for the last four years. Mark arrived in Avonwick from Bristol via North Yorkshire.

By mistake, I've been a builder all my life, but drunkenly decided one night to buy a pub. It's been a steep learning curve, but very rewarding.

First or most memorable ale?

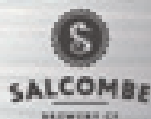

(Ile de Batz)

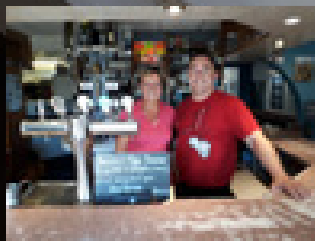
*“Le passeport,

"I want a blue one," he said. "Look Mal, Brexit ain't gonna happen so get your passport pronto." Well I've told you how it ended up. Since starting to write this article our leader has suspended parliament, that's been ruled illegal, we've got a deal but is it going to go through? Probably another extension. Mal is still without a passport and I've told him if he hasn't got it by Christmas, I'll

have to get someone else for next year's trip (round Ireland).

I'd had 2 weeks in Brittany by the time I got to Roscoff and had found no shortage of micro-brewery beers, bottled or keg (no they don't do cask conditioned). From Roscoff I thought a little trip in Sandyman to Ile de Batz would be nice and Sandyman, being a bilge keeler, could take the ground in the drying harbour. Ile de Batz is the small inhabited island just over the water from Roscoff. Easy for you to get to – hop on Brittany Ferries, get off at Roscoff and take a vedette over the water. The date of the

visit was Sunday 7 July 2019 which happened to be the day of the Ile de Batz half-marathon. I was accompanied by my former boat partner Richard Addison. We could see the marathon from the boat but at that time we couldn't work out what was happening. We waited for the tide to go out and walked ashore and watched the end of the ½ marathon. There are a few pleasant hosteleries on Ile de Batz and I'll give you a tour of them. It is a lovely island with lots of excellent paths and walks and not a lot of vehicles. I fancy booking a gite for a week here at some future date.



First stop, Chez Therese bar and mini market where we had some Val de Rance cider which in Brittany is served in china cups. I counted 9 local micro bottled beers on the bar so plenty of choice. Very pleasant but onwards we must go to serve the needs of the Drakes Drinker reader (and my own thirst).

Next stop was my favourite, Ty Bar Do, where I found no lesser lady than Brigitte Bardot herself. Yes, we all wondered what she was up to these days. She is happily married and she and her husband have a jolly good bar in Ile de Batz, ably assisted by

Stephanie from Belfast. The main draught beer is Lancelot Blonde. Other beers are Duchesse Anne, Biere Blanche, and Galopin. Pizzas and oysters – what more can you want? So I had a bottle of Petite Fripouille, a biere ambree brewed by Brasserie De L'Hermine at 7%.

Next was Ty Yann, a restaurant and bar serving Armoria Abaty. I enjoyed the bar but could not stay too long as there were others to visit. La Cassonade overlooks the water and is a smart bar, creperie, and restaurant with a pleasant vibe and appealing location.

The last bar visited was Bar du Port which was not available earlier as it was being used as the main announcement position for the marathon. I had my last drink here where they had Coreff Blonde Bio (5%) and Coreff Dramm Hud biere blonde cuivree at 7.5%, and yes I did have a small one. All in all, a very enjoyable day out at a great location.

We'll have a good Christmas and New Year. In the meantime Mal and I are trying to find a weather window to give me some material for the next article.

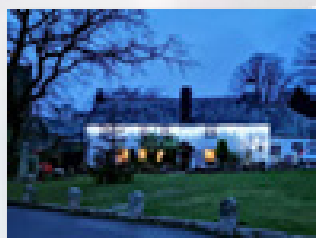

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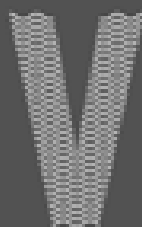
